A Message from Pastor Martinal

Dear Members of the Body of Christ,

Harry Emerson Fosdick once told how as a child, his mother sent him to pick a quart of raspberries. Reluctantly he dragged himself to the berry patch. His afternoon was ruined for sure. Then a thought hit him. He would surprise his mother and pick two quarts of raspberries instead of one. Rather than drudgery, his work now became a challenge. He enjoyed picking those raspberries so much that fifty years later that incident was still fresh in his mind. The job hadn't changed. His attitude had, though, and attitude is everything. (Dynamic Preaching, June 1990)

Our attitude goes a long way in determining what we do and how we react. According to Webster's Dictionary, "attitude" is our "manner, disposition, feeling, position, etc., with regard to a person or thing; tendency or orientation, especially of the mind". As Harry Emerson Fosdick quickly realized, he could either have a negative attitude and view his work as "drudgery", or have a positive attitude and see his work as a "challenge". He wisely chose the latter.

Too often, we have a less than positive and helpful attitude. Whether it be in our jobs, our schooling, our families, our relationships, even in our congregation, many of us tend to have at best a neutral attitude, and at worst a harmful and destructive one. We all fall victim of having an attitude that says we are the ones who need to be served, instead of having an attitude that seeks to serve others.

This is not a new problem we face. When James and John requested to sit at Jesus' right and left hand when He entered His glory, Jesus answered them and all the disciples by saying, "'whoever wants to become great among you must be your servant, and whoever wants to be first must be slave of all. For even the Son of Man did not come to be served, but to serve, and to give His life as a ransom for many". (Mark 10:43-45 NIV84) Years later, St. Paul would write to the congregation in Philippi:

"Do nothing out of selfish ambition or vain conceit, but in humility consider others better than your-selves. Each of you should look not only to your own interests, but also to the interests of others. Your attitude should be the same as that of Christ Jesus: Who, being in the very nature God, did not

consider equality with God something to be grasped, but made Himself nothing, taking the very nature of a servant, being made in human likeness. And being found in appearance as a man, He humbled Himself and became obedient to death — even death on a cross! Therefore God exalted Him to the highest place and gave Him the name that is above every name, that at the name of Jesus every knee should bow, in heaven and on earth and under the earth, and every tongue confess that Jesus Christ is Lord, to the glory of God the Father." (Phil. 2:3-11 NIV84)

This Lenten Season, we will discover the "attitude that makes a difference" as we go through the book, "I Am A Church Member", by Thom Rainer. I cannot stress enough how important and attitude changing this study will be. Please sign up for this attitude changing 7-week study. Because too often, as Thom writes, "we join churches expecting others to serve us, to feed us, and to care for us". (p. 5) This attitude is harmful and not what God intended. "God did not give us local churches to become country clubs where membership means we have privileges and perks. He placed us in churches to serve, to care for others, to pray for leaders, to learn, to teach, to give, and, in some cases, to die for the sake of the gospel". (p. 6) This is the "attitude that makes a difference"!

"When this journey is over for you, two things will likely take place. First, you will likely have a new or renewed attitude about your church. You will learn the joy of being last instead of seeking to be first.... Second, [our] church will begin to change. It will become healthier because [you] are healthier. And as the church gets healthier, it will have a greater impact on its community and the world." (p. 6-7)

Our membership in the body of Christ is a gift by grace through faith. Our response is to have an attitude of gratitude for this most precious and bloodbought gift. A faithful attitude is characterized by a willingness to serve others rather than an insistence on being served. Christ can and does change our attitudes, and equips us for service in His kingdom. May the Lord, "who has begun this good work in you, bring it to completion in the day of our Lord Jesus Christ". (Philippians 1:6 ESV)

You are created and loved by God the Father, redeemed and sent by Jesus Christ, and made holy and empowered by the Holy Spirit to have an attitude that makes a difference,

The Bookkeeper's Corner

Coming soon – new on-line giving program!

Yes, that was the same introductory sentence from the February 2019 article. But there has been a change.

I wrote of our new program called Kindrid. It wasn't until the end of January when I balanced the books I saw the Kindrid report was \$400 off. Neither Kindrid nor Church Extension Fund thought it to be a big deal as there were other reports to use. That explanation proved unacceptable. I went back to our previous platform, Vanco, and negotiated the same rates as what Kindrid/CEF would give us. Our new on-line giving is called **Giving Plus**.

You will have the same two methods of contributions: ACH (auto-bank withdrawal) and your debit/credit card. The fees the church absorbs are as follows:

- a) ACH: .10% of the gift + .25 cents
- b) Credit/Debit cards: 2.5% of the gift + .30 cents
- c) If you choose to absorb the fees, there's a box you can check when making the contribution!

You can contribute weekly, monthly, yearly; any amount to the listed funds; stop/start whenever you want; make a one-time gift or set up for recurring. You are in complete control. You can access your account at any time to see your contributions.

We'll have flyers available in the bulletin with more info and a demo running on the TV in the Gathering Room between services.

We do encourage you to set up an account rather than choosing a one-time gift. At the end of the year you'll want one tax report rather than a report for each one-time gift. Here's how to find the links:

St Paul Website: www.stpaul-millington.org, then select the "Give" tab at the top. Click "Sign In/Sign up" in the upper right corner and away you go.

Mobile: Go to the App Store or Google Play, search for "GivePlus Church", download. Then, search for our church, select, and create your account.

Mission Trip to Thailand (Part 2)



Where is Thailand? Thailand is in the heart of Southeast Asia. Cambodia and Laos border the country to the east and northeast, and Myanmar lies to the northwest. To the west is the Andaman Sea and the Gulf of Thailand, southeast of Burma. The long southern region, connects with Malaysia.

I will be in the city of Chiang Mai in the north where the star is on the map. It takes approximately 20 hours to fly from the USA to reach the school where I will be working. Below, follows the promised menu for the **Thai Dinner with** *American Accents*

The Church Management System

Over a year ago a small ad-hoc group gathered to look at a cloud -based program to replace our aging Shepherd's Staff church management system (ChMS). After reviewing and testing three different systems, Church Council gave approval to upgrade to a new ChMS called Shelby Membership.

What does this mean to you? Everything. Each confirmed congregational member (and their children) will have their own account in the ChMS that you can access at any time. The account includes your personal information, attendance, giving, and what groups you belong to. Families are grouped together, so the head of household can edit any of the family accounts.

The ChMS comes with a calendar with in-depth information. If you check the church web calendar, you'll see it has a new look. Just click on any event and you'll see the details: when, where, what room, costs, etc.

We now have the capability to mass contact you via home phone, cell phone, text, or e-mail. You'll need to tell the church office which method of communication works best for you.

How to start: we chose not to import 1,800 records of stale data into the new system, but rather start fresh with your input. We encourage everyone to request a link to your account and you can populate as many fields as possible. You just need to contact Stacey with your e-mail address and she'll send you the link.

Alternatively, we do have a small team of volunteers that is going to transfer data, piece by piece, from the old system into the new. You will see data request forms around the church that you can fill out and return to the church office.

WHAT IS ORPHAN GRAIN TRAIN?

Orphan Grain Train is a Nonprofit Christian volunteer network that shares personal and material resources with needy people in America and into 67 countries around the world. Orphan Grain Train-Michigan in Sebewaing is the first organized presence of this humanitarian network in our state. Grain Train volunteers gather donations of clothing, medical supplies, food, Christian literature, and other aid to meet real needs. The first pilot team of volunteers is begins in March to process and prepare these goods for distribution from the Sebewaing Center. Orphan Grain Train is a recognized service organization of The Lutheran Church-Missouri Synod and is a loving response to Jesus Christ's example as a servant and His love for us. 
