## A Message from Pastor Abatelli

The message of Epiphany is where God reveals His great love to all people. When the Magi, who were Gentiles, came to worship Jesus it showed all people have access to God because God has intervened to save all.

Can you imagine the travel the Magi had to make? It had to be some distance, because it took time to get there and it says they came "from far away." God intervened with a star which was a sign to them that a King was born. Following this star God gave, they left to find this King, one can only imagine what conversations they had, "Are we sure the star knows where it's going?" One asks, "Did you bring the gifts?" Another's reply, "For the last time, yes."

The star led them to Bethlehem - not to the palace in Jerusalem. They probably thought the star made a mistake, for a King needs to be in a palace. So they veered from Bethlehem to Jerusalem only to find out that they went to the wrong place.

After telling Herod the news, he tried to hide being upset and his intentions. So, calling the experts of Scripture they asked where the child was. Even though Herod's intent was malicious, God used this situation to intervene and give the Magi the right place. The experts pointed saying, "In Bethlehem in Judea."

The Magi struggled to believe these words; to be led to such an inappropriate setting for a Royal birth. But again God intervened to give them comfort and strength with that star that led them from the beginning.

Then the star stopped over the place where the child was. They were overwhelmed to see the star and went to the door. After they were let in they saw the child with His mother, Mary. Mary said, "This is Jesus." Their doubts and hesitation in their hearts were turned to joy and assurance when they saw that Child. Immediately they fell down and worshiped him.

Can you imagine the thoughts in the Magi's minds? "This is it! This is the King! Where are the gifts?" They opened their gifts offering gold, frankincense, and myrrh. What confusion for Mary and Joseph to see this done and what was given. These gifts were fit for a King and that was just what Christ was. Seeing this King and realizing that God has intervened for all mankind.

As the Magi rested, God intervened again in a dream to warn them not to go back to Herod. We don't know what the warning was, but we know the results. I can't help but picture the conversation after the dream. "That was a weird dream." Another says, "You had to same one?" Another states, "Forget Herod, let's leave for our country by another road."

God intervened in their lives ultimately by that Child. It is in that Christ Child He has intervened to save us. That Child grew to live, die and rise for us so that we could be lavished with His love and grace. We are forgiven people changed by God's intervention in that Child to live for him. God has also intervened to give us His Spirit to live for Him.

What happened to the Magi after seeing God intervene? God's Word does not tell us. But we can know that this encounter had to have a deep impact in their lives. How about us? After we have heard all of what God has done to intervene in our lives to save us from Christ's birth, death, and resurrection does it impact us? Does knowing Christ came and died and rose do anything? YES! We are forgiven and strengthened because God has intervened to save us, when we could not save ourselves.

Arise! Shine! Your light has come, and the glory of the LORD has dawned. Darkness now covers the earth, and thick darkness covers the nations.

But the LORD dawns, and his glory appears over you.

Isaiah 60:1-2

Christ has appeared and His glory and saving love is over us. We hold onto this truth and rejoice in it for our hearts are thrilled with His joy. The joy of Christ, so we then will bring Him gifts of our hearts whether gold, incense, singing, praises, and the very thing He came to save... ourselves.



## Lutherans for Life / Lutheran Hour

Incest involves a complex family situation that will not be cured or stopped by abortion. Abortion promises silence and makes it possible for the incest to continue. The more effective response to pregnancies resulting from incest is to deal with the environment in which the girl is being victimized. Aborting the girl's baby and then returning her to the family situation that caused the problem in the first place is no solution.

Years after incest has stopped, victimized women report lingering pain and scars, but many cling to the promise in Psalm 147:3 that God heals the brokenhearted and binds up their wounds. Victims of rape and incest often struggle for a long time with self-esteem, but many claim that what has helped them with the sense of degradation is a personal relationship with Jesus Christ.

"He loves me just the way I am," said one victim. "I don't have to be perfect or have to earn His love!" said another. "I am absolutely complete in Christ," wrote a third.

When Love Begins: If the value of human life is to have any meaning, then its value cannot depend on, or be diminished by, the circumstances that brought about that new human life. God maps out the tapestry of life for each child, whether a child is the product of love and marriage or the product of rape and incest. It is not a question of when life begins. It is a question of when love begins, and God's love for each child begins in His mind and heart before they were even conceived.

Note: A good resource on the issue of rape and incest is Victims and Victors. (David C. Reardon, Julie Makimaa, Amy Sobie editors. (Acorn Books, Springfield, IL; available from the Elliot Institute: <a href="www.afterabortion.org">www.afterabortion.org</a>) In this book, those who have experienced sexual assault speak out about their pregnancies, abortions, and children. Some quotes from the book that may be helpful to you or someone you know:

"I, having lived through rape, and also having raised a child 'conceived in rape,' feel personally assaulted and insulted every time I hear that abortion should be legal because of rape and incest. I feel that we're being used to further the abortion issue, even though we've not been asked to tell our side of the story."

"After my daughter was born, it was love at first sight ...I know I made the right decision in having her."

"Often I cry. Cry because I could not stop the attacks. Cry because my daughter is dead. And I cry because it still hurts."

"They say abortion is the easy way out, the best thing for everyone, but they are wrong. It has been over 15 years, and I still suffer."

"Abortion does not help or solve a problem—it only compounds and creates another trauma for the already grieving victim by taking away the one thing that can bring joy."

"The effects of the abortion are much more farreaching than the effects of the rape in my life."

"I thank God for the strength He gave me to go through the bad times and for all of the joy in the good times. I will never regret that I chose to give life to my daughter."



## Giving Tree / Miscellaneous

#### **Giving Tree**

I was recently told that "I couldn't save the world on my own" by someone who cares about me and the Giving Tree. I appreciate her kind words and concern and I love her but... I WANT TO SAVE THE WORLD!! The Giving Tree and all that it does is so vitally important to me. I care so much and through all of the stars that are taken from the tree and the donations, my heart is gladdened by all of you who care also.

Each year there seems to be a greater need. This year we not only helped 20 people through Lutheran Family Children Services (which is now called Wellspring) with gifts, we helped 25 families here in our church and community. These families consisted of 84 individuals. I believe that is the most we have ever had!

Following the premise of the Wisemen giving baby Jesus three gifts, this is what we try and do. The three gifts usually include underwear or clothing of some sort, boots, snow pants or a coat, and a toy or personal item valued at no more than \$30. There are always exceptions, but those are the guidelines we try to follow. We provide a "family basket" which consists of toothpaste, shampoo & conditioner, Kleenex, toilet paper, paper towel, laundry detergent, dish soap and household cleaner. These are all items that if you were getting assistance from the state, you COULD NOT purchase with food stamps. With the kind help of some St. Paul bakers, we also include a tin of homemade cookies and this year, someone donated navy beans so they are receiving beans and a recipe for navy bean soup. We give them a gas card and a grocery card. Dorcas often gives us quilts and we always have talented people who provide hats, scarves and mittens.

My greatest wish is when these families pick up their gifts and family baskets, they see much more than a toy and some paper towels; I want them to see LOVE! I want them to see that we as a church family love them and care about them and that through us, they will realize that our love comes through Him! I want them to see a basket of HOPE, hope that things will get better, we understand and it will be alright.

When the Wisemen came to present those gifts to Jesus, they were the finest gifts to be had. When we give the gifts for the Giving Tree, that gift might be the only gift a child will be receiving. That is why we try so hard to make sure they have a wonderful CHRISTmas. There is nothing wrong with handing down a toy or a pair of jeans or shoes; my children have always done that. But if it might be the only gift opened, I want to do all in my power to know that child will know just how precious he is by opening a new toy or shirt or shoes. We can add other gently used items in his package to go along with it and those are appreciated, but everyone deserves something new, all theirs, because they deserve it, they are special and God loves each and every one of them, regardless of their financial situation. No one should feel that they are only worth someone's cast off.

I cannot thank all of you enough for your very generous support every year. I get so excited, wishing I could see their faces when they open up that special gift lovingly provided by one of you.

The Giving Tree consumes me but in a good way! It reminds me how blessed I am. It helps me to remember to pray for these people who need help. I don't know their names, but that is just fine with me, God knows. It helps renew a love for all of my St. Paul family and through the generous donations and love from all of you, I can feel that I am doing a little part to save the world! In later years Luther often remarked that the -- turning point -- for him -- came when he understood the force of the phrase, "the righteousness of God" (Rom. 1:17).

What Luther Says: ...I anxiously and busily worked to understand the word of Paul in Rom. 1:17. I questioned this passage for a long time and labored over it, for the expression "righteousness of God" barred...my way. This phrase was customarily explained to mean that the righteousness of God (the wrath of God) is a virtue by which He is Himself righteous and condemns sinners. As often as I read this passage, I wished that God had never revealed the Gospel; for who could love a God who was angry, who judged and condemned people? This misunderstanding continued until, enlightened by the Holy Spirit, I finally examined more carefully the word of Habakkuk: "The just shall live by his faith" (2:4). From this passage I concluded that life must be derived from faith... Then the entire Holy Scripture became clear to me, and heaven itself was opened to me. [3906] If we are to live righteously because of righteousness by faith and this righteousness of God is intended to save everyone who believes, it follows that righteousness is by faith and life by righteousness.

[1401 – But the real faith, of which we are speaking, cannot be brought into being by our own thoughts. On the contrary, it is entirely God's work in us, without any co-operation on our part...Therefore it is a very mighty, active, restless, busy thing, which at once renews a man, gives him a second birth, and introduces him to a new manner and way of life, so that it is impossible for him not to do good without ceasing. For as naturally as a tree bears fruit, good works follow upon faith.]

I gathered a similar sense from other expressions. Thus the "work of God" is that which God works in us; the "strength of God" is that through which He makes us strong; the "wisdom of God" is that through which He makes us wise; ... 1
