It seems gratitude is rare. This thought is proven right in a true story I heard. On a public transportation bus, the people were crammed in, swaying back and forth chaotically in the aisle as the vehicle made stops and started going again. A sickly, elderly man boarded the bus and made his way down the aisle. Suddenly, a middle-age woman stood up and offered him her seat. He fainted, and when he regained consciousness, he said, "Thank you" to the lady. In shock of his words, she fainted.

We, as Christians, know we have a lot to be thankful for, but sometimes we forget. We forget like illmannered children, offer no thanks and perhaps feel no thankfulness, but rather feel entitled for those many blessings that not only God gives, but those around us also give us.

Why is thankfulness so rare? Why is it so far from our minds? Have we fallen into the world's ideas that we deserve what God does? Do we feel entitled, that people owe us? God saw this state we are in and in His love and mercy sent Christ. God wanted us as His children. Christ went to the cross and died for what we rightly deserve. We are not entitled to what God gave freely in Christ. God did not owe us anything for Christ dying on the cross to forgive our sins, our ungratefulness. Only out of His love and grace He gave us a Savior.

After all the undeserving love God gave us, let us continually offer to God a sacrifice of praise - the fruit of lips that openly profess his name. Hebrews 13:15

Note the word *continually*. Thankfulness is not just a one time saying, "Thank you," like celebrating Thanksgiving each year. It is constantly being grateful.

Not only was God gracious to us in Christ, think of a few reasons in your life to be grateful. For me, I am thankful for you, the members at St. Paul for giving me the opportunity to attend the All Church Worker Conferences. I am thankful for the maid who helped when I asked for assistance. She did not have to, didn't owe me anything, but did help. I am thankful for the waiter at the conference lunch who gave our table the extra desert. I am thankful that my brother-in-law and sister-in-law watched my kids so Katie and I could go to the conference. They did not have to do it, but did. I am thankful that God has placed these people in my life.

Pick something you are thankful for. Need help? Right now, go to a mirror in your house- I will wait. Put your nose to the mirror and watch. See any condensation? Yup, there is reason right there- you are alive. Walk to your Bible, I will wait again. There is another reason right there. God loved us enough to give His words of love in the Bible.

In Colossians, Paul goes further on how to give thanks continually for all the grace God has shown us, making us His righteous people.

Devote yourselves to prayer, being watchful and thankful. And pray for us, too, that God may open a door for our message, so that we may proclaim the mystery of Christ, for which I am in chains. Pray that I may proclaim it clearly, as I should. Be wise in the way you act toward outsiders; make the most of every opportunity. Let your conversation be always full of grace, seasoned with salt, so that you may know how to answer everyone. col.4:2-6

While all prayers of gratitude and praise always need to be in our hearts and on our tongues, another way we thank God is through our actions. Colossians tells us to be wise and keep our conversations "full of grace." The Holy Spirit gives us power - energized by Christ Jesus' life and death and life again - to live out our praise and thankfulness in our actions too.

As you search for reasons to be thankful, remember what Jesus did for you. Then it will be easier to speak graceful words to someone who doesn't deserve them. In your actions show your grace filled gratitude even if you owe them nothing.

SUSAN G. KOMEN FOUNDATION'S LINK TO PLANNED PARENTHOOD

(ABORTION RISK FACTOR INCREASES BREAST CANCER BY 40%)

Prolife individuals are often concerned that their charitable donations could go to an organization that in some way supports abortion or supports other organizations which support abortion. The following fact sheet discusses the way Susan G. Komen Foundation's ties to America's leading abortion provider, Planned Parenthood. Komen affiliates have a long history of giving grants to Planned Parenthood. In the fiscal year 2009, Susan G. Komen affiliates gave \$731,303 to Planned Parenthood affiliates. From 2004-2009, Komen affiliates gave a total of approximately \$3.3 million in grants to Planned Parenthood affiliates. Susan G. Komen defends these grants by saying they are only used for breast cancer screenings. However, grant money is fungible so when Planned Parenthood receives funding from the Komen Foundation they are now able to spend more of their other money on performing and promoting abortions. Komen's leadership has ties to Planned Parenthood. Nancy Brinker, the founder of the Susan G. Komen Foundation, was listed as an advisory board member in the 2002 annual report of Planned Parenthood of North Texas, the fifth largest Planned Parenthood affiliate in the nation. Nancy Brinker received the Gertrude Shelburne Humanitarian Award from Planned Parenthood of North Texas in 1996. Gertrude Shelburne established Planned Parenthood in Dallas and was a friend of Planned Parenthood's founder, Margaret Sanger. Komen openly denies the link between abortion and breast cancer. The Susan G. Komen Foundation officially denies the link between abortion and breast cancer. To support their position, Komen sites conclusions from a 2003 workshop hosted by the National Cancer Institute. The chair of that workshop was Dr. Louise Brinton. More recently, Dr. Brinton co-authored a study which found abortion increases breast cancer risk by 40 percent and accepts abortion as a "known or suspected" risk factor. Others are coming to the same conclusion. The Coalition on Abortion/Breast Cancer web site shows the majority of published peer-reviewed studies indicate abortion increases the risk of breast cancer. The reason why the Susan G. Komen Foundation denies the link between abortion and breast cancer can only be answered by them. Upto-date research links induced abortion to breast cancer. Women who are facing an untimely pregnancy and women with past abortions have the right to be informed. Women deserve to know the facts about future health risks regarding medical procedures.
