## **Stand Against—Stand For**

Sharing the Message of Lutherans for Life, Abortion and the Church, Worldview and Culture

We know Luther's words. "I cannot and will not recant anything, for to go against conscience is neither right nor safe. Here I stand; I can do no other, so help me God. Amen." Luther stood against the false teachings of the church of his day. He risked his life to do so. He stood against indulgences, works righteousness, and the undermining of Scriptural authority.

At the same time, Luther also stood *for* truth. Luther stood for grace alone, for faith alone, and for Scripture alone. His conviction of these truths gave him the courage to risk his life and stand against the falsehoods that assaulted him.

Paul reminds us to stand against. "Put on the whole armor of God, that you may be able to stand against the schemes of the devil" (Ephesians 6:11). The devil uses many schemes to erode faith, and we err greatly if we exclude abortion and the increasing receptivity of assisted suicide from his arsenal. Worse, we become co-schemers when we consign such assaults on life to the political or social realm and do not stand against them as "spiritual forces of evil" (6:12). We risk insults, controversy, division, and, perhaps sooner than we might think, our lives to take such a stand.

As for Luther, our courage to stand against comes from standing *for* God's truth. We stand *for* His Trinitarian truth about life. He creates each life. He has redeemed each life. He desires to call each life. Nothing else matters when it comes to assigning value to human life. We have a positive message to share. We have a message that sends the devil scurrying. We have a message that changes hearts and lives.

Luther did not just stand *against* what the church of his day taught. He stood *for* the truth that God taught. We do not just stand against what our culture is for when it comes to the value of life. We stand for what our God is for! He gives us His armor to stand against. He gives us His truth to stand for. ## A Letter from the Board of Stewardship / Financial Report

Dear Fellow Members:

In 1997, after much prayer, debate and discussion, the members of St. Paul, as one body moving forward, chose, with the help of God, to make much needed additions to our school. A second phase of classrooms was added in 2001. The monthly mortgage payment at this time was \$11,000.00.

Then again in 2009, after much prayer, debate, discussion and healthy disagreement, this congregation chose to boldly move forward with providing a much needed gymnasium/activity center for the benefit of the entire congregation. The congregation undertook a large scale fundraising event with pledged commitments for three years. After the gymnasium/activity center was completed, the new monthly payment became \$14,135.00.

Taking on huge debt by a congregation is never without concern. For 15 of the last 17 years, the members of this congregation came together and made every monthly mortgage payment, as well as met the daily needs of the congregation.

In the last two years, the amount donated has declined. For several months, we have not received enough money to make the monthly mortgage payment. We had some money on account for a rainy day and have used some of that each month to make up the difference. That money is now gone. If there is not a renewed pattern of giving, we will be forced to take money from the general fund offering on a monthly basis to make up for the shortcoming. Our general fund cannot afford that.

The purpose of this letter is to be sure that the congregation is aware of this situation. We also wish to remind you that for approximately 125 years whenever a challenge has presented itself to this congregation the members have come together and responded positively.

We wish to encourage you to look closely at what you can do to help. We respectfully ask that as you evaluate your personal response to this crisis, keep these two things in mind: first, it is important that we do not take money from our already struggling general fund to benefit the building fund and second, it is important that we find a solution to improve our building fund offering that will be sustained for the long haul. If we each do a small part, whether it be giving up one Starbucks coffee, or not going out to eat each one time, together we will more than provide for what God has blessed us with.

It is hoped that as in the past, this generation will band together for the common goal of meeting all of our financial obligations.

## Food for Thought. . .What Do You Think?

#### All Things New: Do Today's Families Have Room for Church?

If you take the time to ask a parent to list all the different roles they fill in their houses, you'd better be sure that you have some time to spare. A list like this would include everything from caregiver to garbage collector, from chef to taxi driver, from counselor to coach and all sorts of roles in-between. If a person were to attempt to receive higher education to be employed in all of the different jobs that parents fill, it would take at least a couple of lifetimes to get the necessary education and then a few more lifetimes to pay the student loans. Parenting is as multi-faceted as it gets, yet we really receive very little training for it other than the modeling of how we were raised. This leads to parents who are constantly running around between these different roles, while at the same time wondering if anything they are doing is good or if it will last with their kids.

How does the church fit into this picture? Another question lies behind this and really gets to the heart of the matter: Can church even fit into this picture? Is there any room for us to squeeze the church into the lives of our families? Even though we do not want to say it this bluntly, this is the question that too often pervades our thinking as church workers. It's a question that comes out of despair, frustration, and a lost identity of what the church has to offer.

Let's first look at what families don't have room or time for. They don't have time for another purely social outing or gathering. They don't have room for another concert or show. They don't have room to be a crowd-control chaperone on yet another trip or event. The vast majority of today's families already have a schedule filled with all those types of things, and they aren't chomping at the bit to add more of the same.

Is the solution found in the church simply outperforming those other activities? Here's what happens when we try this. We see churches that advertise their relationships as "authentic" and "accepting", even though there are many times when, in order to be authentic, you can't accept what someone is doing. We sell worship as an emotional entertaining experience all about us, when people really want a chance to get outside of themselves and sing about something greater than their story. We put the focus on the individual's relationship with Christ to appeal to the cultural sense of individualism, and then are befuddled when they don't give money to support a corporate church system. Even more, they don't want to use their spiritual gifts for the building up of the body of Christ. The really sad thing is that a scan of churches across the country will reveal that this is where so much of our effort and ingenuity is going. We're trying to outperform the culture at being culture in an effort to have church outrank the other activities and roles that today's families have.

The focus should not be on the church trying to compete with the rest of the family schedule in order to win a few time slots each week, month or year. Instead, we need to focus on what the church has to offer that no one else can: Christ. We can and should seek excellence in all that we do, but that's ultimately not how we reach out to people as the church. The greatest thing we have to offer today's families is the same thing that God's church has offered from Genesis on. What separates us is not a style of worship, but a God from whose love nothing can separate us (Romans 8:38-39). What sets us apart is not an active small group program, but a God who sets us apart in Baptism and adopts us as members of His family (Isaiah 43:1, Ephesians 1:5). What "sells" the church is not a certain atmosphere on Sunday mornings, but that the very Son of God bought us at the price of His own life (1 Peter 1:18-19).

So, to answer the big question, do today's families have room for church? Absolutely, if they know what the church is actually about. Families don't need another event to add to the calendar, they need an overarching purpose for all of those things on their calendar (Matthew 28:19-20). Parents are constantly worried and anxious about their kids and their lives. They need a God who promises to always be with us (Philippians 4:6-7, Hebrews 13:5) and gives peace through His Word, the Sacraments, and prayer. Every household, whether it's "broken" by divorce or not, is broken by sin and is in desperate need of forgiveness (Romans 3:23-24). The list can go on and on, but it is really summarized in this: our families need Jesus. Plain and simple. And that's something that no other organization, activity, entertainment or system can offer. Can families "fit" church in? I don't think they can afford not to. It's not something you work on simply fitting in, but it's something you build your life, house and family around. In whatever area of ministry that you are involved in, let God's gifts be the focus and the highlight, because there is truly nothing else around that can compare. That's what will lead families to use their gifts as part of the Church God has made.


