A Message from Pastor Bruner

Dear Brothers and Sisters in Christ,

A boy once attended a Lutheran elementary school for only two years. This brief time assisted his parents in sharing the Word of God with him. Most of all, they are taught grace and mercy that comes through Jesus Christ alone. first hint that the effects of the fall will one day be undone when the serpent is crushed (3:15). **Chs 6-9** Seth's descendants increasingly participate in the evil that overwhelms God's creation, preferring their own inclinations toward beauty and power over God's clear will for their lives. God threatens judgment but also salvation for His chosen family. Faithful Noah and his family experience the greatest horror this earth has known, but the ark carries them up and away from the destruction and total devastation by the great flood. Noah demonstrates extraordinary patience and God acts freely to reflect His character, making the world "very good" (1:31). He takes great care to place man and woman in the garden to care for the things that He created. Ch 2 is a more detailed account of creation, focusing on the creation of humankind. Ch 3 The serpent tempts Adam and Eve to sin. With the words that God speaks to the ser-pent, to Eve, and to Adam after their disobedience, he sets the course for the rest of biblical history. Here there is judgment for sin, but also the willingness to listen and obey God while confined in the ark for more than a year. God reassures Noah and his family that He will never again send a universal flood. The problem of sin reappears with Noah's sinful drunkenness, which results in tragic consequences for his family. God's first act, the creation, is an act of grace. DOCTRINAL CONTENT: Chs 1-3

Chs 12-19 God calls Abram to faith, giving him a promise that God Himself would fulfill for all people. Although God promises Abram that he will possess the land that God will give him, Abram still finds no secure place in which to dwell.

Genesis and the Rest of the Bible: The events in Genesis introduce the Book of Exodus, but they also provide the proper perspective for the entire OT as well as the New. Genesis emphasizes that salvation is by the promise of grace and not through the Law—and that the succeeding history of Israel recounts God in action to fulfil that promise. As such, Génesis controls the interpretation of the entire OT by writing across each page: Abraham "believed God, and it was counted to him as righteousness" (Gal 3:6; cf Gn 15:6).

"Cooperative Catechesis: A Model for Equipping Lutheran Parents and Congregations to Catechize Children in the Christian Faith."

From my dissertation (still very much a draft):

"Parents catechize their children constantly. Despite the notion some parents hold that they are unable to teach, they are always teaching—good or bad. Take, for instance, a father who is a fan of the Green Bay Packers professional football team. Whether he realizes it or not he is catechizing his children to be Packers fans. The father does not set aside an hour of each week to teach his children about the basics of football, the importance of team loyalty, or why rooting for the Packers makes sound logical sense. He does not send his children once a week to a class taught by an assistant football coach to learn about being football fans. When his children reach a certain age, he certainly does not contact the head coach of the Packers to evaluate his children to determine if they are ready to be Packers fans.

Instead, the father simply lives out his life as a fan and models what it looks like to be faithful to the Green Bay Packers for his children. He talks about football in casual conversation. He introduces his children to watching or attending football games and sits with them as they experience it together. He answers his children's questions about field goals, downs, and interceptions while also offering up his own commentary on what makes football and the Packers so great. As his children age, they begin to follow their father's example. At some point, they may be ready to play football, but even if not they have grown up hearing about it and seeing their father speak, act, and even dress like a Packers fan. More often than not, because of their exposure to their father's duiful and continual catechesis, his children will eventually take on more responsibility for learning about football on their own. In time, like their father, they will don the green and gold jersey as they sit with their own children and pass down what they have learned.

Parents teach their children every day. Children learn from their parents everything from social skills to work ethics to sports fanaticism. It is time that children learn from their parents what it means to be a faithful disciple of Jesus Christ and what it means to be a Lutheran. The church is here to help, but the parents must do it."

When it came to the six chief parts of the catechism, Luther began the small catechism with these words, "As the head of the family should teach them in a simple way to his household.

That head of the family is chiefly meant to be the father, but in the reality of today's world, it is both parents. How do parents spe-cifically go about modeling the Christian faith and life to their children and grandchildren? It is not as hard as you may think. Apply your faith to daily living, by speaking of God's Word as it applies to daily events that occur in the family. Attend church regularly to show children the importance of faith in your life. Study God's Word in plain sight of your children through daily reading (maybe even together as a family) or Adult Bible study in order to show that we can always grow in our knowledge of God's truth. Volunteer to help with activities at church or become involved in administering the church through elective office. All of these can be accomplished through the ministry and programs available at St. Paul. Parents, you are the most important teacher your children will ever have on this earth. Walk the life of faith as an example for your children to follow.

Through our 500th Anniversary Celebration, the District will raise funds in support of four initiatives:


- Professional Church Worker Scholarships help provide funding for substantial scholarships for students who have I. committed their lives to serving the Church
