#### A Message from Pastor Bruner

Dear Brothers and Sisters in Christ,

Hunting season is coming. Suppose a hunter is successful at hitting the wild game but does not know how to dress out the kill. There is more to hunting than just shooting. There are many lessons to learn: hunter safety, scouting the game, properly harvesting the animal, and then how to prepare a tasty meal with the meat. There are parents that spend a lot of time passing on important lessons about hunting. This is good, and it also builds a relationship with their child(ren).

Whether you are a hunter or not... or agree with hunting or not, I want to encourage all of us to "go on the hunt." Pass on the many important Christian lessons and build a relationship with other hunters and our own children.

Not all hunters are successful every time. As Christians, we can have a successful hunt each time. Our hunt is <u>for</u> the Word of God and <u>through</u> the Word of God. Consider the hunting theme in these verses.

"The days are coming," declares the Sovereign LORD, "when I will send a famine through the land – not a famine of food or a thirst for water, but a famine of hearing the words of the LORD. Men will stagger from sea to sea and wander from north to east, searching for the word of the LORD, but they will not find it." Amos 8:11

"Seek the LORD while he may be found..." and receive the nourishment He brings through the Holy Scriptures. "...My word... goes out from my mouth: It will not return to me empty but will accomplish what I desire and achieve the purpose for which I sent it." Isaiah 55:6, 11

"Consequently, faith comes from hearing the message, and the message is heard through the word of Christ." Romans 10:17

This past month I spoke with people who expressed the importance of being in the Word of God. One person grieves that their sibling no longer believes the Bible. This sibling has given up hunting for God and His truth. A non-Lutheran said to me that so many people do not know what the Bible really says. This person appreciates how the Lutheran Church focuses on teaching the Word of God to others.

There has always been a need to pass on the skill of hunting, for physical <u>and</u> spiritual food. In Luther's day he wrote the Small Catechism because so many people did not know the Word of God or the basic teachings of our Christ-centered faith. He developed the catechism so that parents could pass on the important tradition of hunting and harvesting the spiritual food in the Bible.

There are many lessons to be shared about hunting animals. Hunting through the Bible also involves a lifetime of learning. Apply the same principles. Start early and build upon previous lessons. It is never too late to start. Trust God to help each of you to be successful in the hunt.

"Teach me, O Lord, to follow your decrees; then I will keep them to the end.... How I long for your precepts! Preserve my life in your righteousness." Psalm 119:33-40 "Teach me to do your will, for you are my God; may your good Spirit lead me on level ground." Psalm 143:10

God desires for us to grow in our relationship with Him and with one another. This growth will happen as we spend time together... on the hunt.

## **Bookkeeper's Corner / Nominating Form**

#### The Bookkeeper's Corner

I've been sitting in the bookkeeper seat for two months now and have found folks have more questions than answers about our financial activities. I'm going to take a stab at writing an article each month to answer the questions I hear most frequently.

Probably the most asked question and the biggest source of confusion is the difference between the General Fund, a Designated Fund, and a Memorial Fund and how they're used.

- a. **General Fund**. The Church is the recipient of general revenue. General revenue comes from two primary sources: offering envelopes (your tithes) marked \*general fund\* and K-8 school tuition. Any miscellaneous offerings are also allocated to the general fund. We pay **all** our employees (Pastors down to hourly workers) and our monthly bills (utilities, insurance, health care) from these funds. This represents the lion's share of our budget.
- b. **Designated Fund**. These funds are set up for specific purposes and each Board is required to manage the funds associated with their Board. A good example of a Designated Fund is the Building Fund: your tithe envelope and other donations are filtered into this account where the monthly mortgage payment is created. All of our fundraiser events are captured in a designated fund such as LYF or PTL. What many folks don't know is the school Registration Fees are allocated to a designated fund the school must pay for all their books and supplies from your registration fees. They do not receive general operating funds from any other source.
- c. **Memorial Fund**. Probably the least understood, these funds are set aside by a family. The funds are either designated for a specific purpose, or the funds sit in the account until the family decides where to spend the money. If the family designates the funds for a purpose, the Board in charge of that program (such as choir robes, chancel paraments, etc) can spend the money as the need arises. If the family has not designated the money and a need arises, we must obtain permission from the family to spend it. This is a fine, but important, distinction.

What have you come here to see? (Mt 11.7–9). This is one of the questions Jesus puts to the crowds at this turning point in Matthew's Gospel as opposition to Jesus grows. Perhaps more appropriately, on Reformation Sunday the question should be: "What did you come here to do?" This alternate Gospel reading will not permit Reformation Sunday to be a horn-tooting, self-congratulatory, back-slapping celebration. Such an affair would be in contradiction to the Gospels themselves, which focus not on human achievement, but upon the humbling, mighty deeds of God. Faithfully celebrating the Reformation would entail voicing Jesus's own call, "Let the one who has ears hear" (v. 15) Neither should Reformation Sunday preaching be a form of historical fiction. Not to say that there isn't a place for giving thanks for the mighty acts of God in the 16th century. The call to hear was made by Luther over and against the allurements of the Roman system of salvation. However, the allurements of the present age are not the same as those of the 16th of century. Today, the allurements are those of the marketplace, mammon, possessions, and personal self-fulfillment and happiness. be wise regarding the works of God manifested in Elijah (John the Baptist) and the Son of Man who came eating and drinking with tax collectors and sinners. Luther's voice cried out Service Setting 5: "Salvation for all You came to bring ... Hear our cry and grant our supplication" (<u>LSB</u> 942). While God's call in the past is not mute today, the call today must help the baptized to see that they did not enter the reign of heaven manifested in the church's life on earth to see people dressed in soft clothing. Life as part of the people of God can Rather, Jesus's voice should cry out: "Let the one who has ears hear." For the generation to whom the days of fulfillment have come in Jesus's preaching, the call is to hear and so in his day: "Hear that salvation is for sinners by grace through faith for Christ's sake alone." It is a cry reflected in the words of his own Kyrie utilized in the LSB Luther mass, Divine bring violent consequences spiritually, relationally, materially, and physically. Death to the old ways, life in the new.

True wisdom resides in the Father through his Son and Spirit and in his mighty acts of salvation. The people of God, by the Spirit, see God's wisdom that "Christ is the hope and saving light" (<u>LSB</u> 938). Proclamation of this gospel on Reformation should help the church to see herself rightly through God's wisdom. The wisdom to recognize that the church remains under attack and "that violent men are trying to snatch it away" (v. 12).

Our teaching should help the church to envision herself as associated with John the Baptist. As one who soberly awaits the establishment of God's reign by seeking to follow God's peace in the body of Christ, Baptism, and the Lord's Supper—should be the way -- that those who have ears, hear. In living this way, the church will witness to the wisdom of God will. We should help the church to envision herself as united to Christ Jesus the Lord, the One, who reveals God's wisdom by befriending (having mercy on) sinners. The church should be accused of living soberly according to God's will and forgiving without reservation in God's name. The mighty deeds of God—preaching and speaking forgiveness and mplicated in God's mighty deeds. That is why people come together on Reformation Sunday.
