A Message from Pastor Abatelli

Can we imagine what the New Year will bring? Can we imagine what God will do in 2017? Can we imagine what He is going to do through us?

There are so many possibilities that God could do to use us in this New Year. Look at what He already did at Christmas giving us the Christ child. He came to "forgive us, renew us and lead us so we can delight in his will and walk in His ways," empowered by His Spirit to go and extend His Kingdom.

In the Lord's Prayer we say, "Thy Kingdom come." We know God's Kingdom does come without our prayers, but we pray that God uses us to extend His kingdom of grace, a.k.a the Gospel, to the world. Extending in our words and actions - can you imagine the possibilities? There are so many thoughts, ideas, and dreams of what and how God will use us to spread this Gospel in 2017. What will He do? These possibilities are endless because "with God all things are possible."

What has God placed upon your heart for this New Year? Keep in mind not every dream we have is from God. We have to search the Scriptures and see if what is there is from God. More than one has shared, can you imagine or envision what could happen if we could pay off the mortgage? What could that money do? Pay a tuition for a student who wants to go to school at Saint Paul? Assist people to go to Christian counseling? Aid those who need food and clothing? Help those with medical bills? Wow. The possibilities! But why wait to act? With God's Spirit, we can act on what God has placed in your heart, or achieve steps to reach that kingdom extending goal.

Jesus has done so much for us in His coming as a babe in Bethlehem, living a perfect life to die a perfect sacrifice, then to rise and give us a new life. Wow, look at what God gave to forgive us for staying in the dream or imagine world instead of acting. But that is not all; God gave us His Spirit to use what godly things he has placed upon our hearts to do and not stay stuck in inaction.

Aesthetic Grant Program

- We received a flyer from the Church Extension Fund (CEF) advising us they have funds available to beautify the church and school!
- The funds are in the form of a reimbursement grant up to \$2,000 per congregation, *plus* an additional 10% of the amount expended over the initial grant of \$2,000. Maximum grant per congregation is \$20,000.

What does that mean in English? If approved, CEF will reimburse the church at 100% for expenditures up to \$2,000. Anything over \$2,000 they'll throw in an additional 10%. Say we have a project that costs \$5,000: CEF will reimburse the initial \$2,000 plus another \$300 for a total of \$2,300.

The grant program is designed for cosmetic facility improvements – not maintenance.

This grant program expires 12/31/17 so we have some time. Please let a Trustee know what type of enhancement you'd like to see in the church and/or school so we can bring ideas to the Voter's Meetings.

Bookkeeper's Corner / Special Services

The Bookkeeper's Corner

What could we do with an extra \$14,000 each month? Imagine not having to pay our monthly mortgage payment of \$14,135. Let's look at options for paying off this debt sooner.

- a) **Current Situation.** Based on our current terms of 2.25% interest, current principal loan balance of \$927,576 and paying **\$14,135** a month, we have about 71 months left to pay (thru October 2022) on our debt. On 01/31/20 (the balloon maturity date), if we have not paid the loan in full, the interest rate is subject to go up, then we would need to recalculate for the remaining two years. In the end, we end up paying \$63,154 in interest plus any rate raise we incur after 01/31/20.
- b) **Paying off in 5 Years.** Using the same interest rate and current loan balance, we would have 60 months left to pay (thru November 2021) on the debt. Once again, on 01/31/20 (the balloon maturity date), if we have not paid the loan in full, the interest rate is subject to change and we would need to recalculate for the remaining year. Going this route, we would have a monthly mortgage payment of **\$16,360** and would pay \$54,022 in interest plus any rate raise we incur after 01/31/20.
- c) **Paying off in 38 Months.** Using the same interest rate and current loan balance, we would pay off the debt by the balloon maturity date of 01/31/20. We're done. This option would cost us a monthly mortgage payment of **\$25,313**, but we'd only be paying a total of \$34,305 in interest.

As Luther would say, "What does this mean"?

- a) Keep going like we are and be debt free in 2022.
- b) Increase our givings by \$2,225/month and pay off in 5 years and be debt free by 2021
- c) Increase our givings by \$11,178/month and be debt free in 38 months.

How realistic is increasing the monthly mortgage based on our givings? Here are the monthly giving numbers for 2016:

Note: The mortgage payment funds are gathered in the previous month contributions. Remember that any special payment against principal (like the Fish Fry) will reduce our overall interest payable as well as reduce the mortgage balance.

We met our obligation 60% of the time.

These facts and figures are here for you to prayerfully reflect upon and determine just how much we're going to trust in Him to provide without question.

Malachi 3:10 brings things into perspective: "Bring the full tithe into the storehouse, that there may be food in my house. And thereby put me to the test, says the Lord of hosts, if I will not open the windows of heaven for you and pour down for you a blessing until there is no more need".

It's interesting that this is the **only** place in scripture that God gives humans permission to test him. Shall we?

and rise again from the dead. He then would ascend and, as our High Priest, be "seated at the right hand of the throne of the Majesty in the heavens" (Heb 8:1). In Revesekiel grants a proleptic view in the heaven of what the apostles would see on earth: "The Word became flesh and tabernacled among us, and we beheld his glory, the glory of the only-begotten from the Father, full of grace and truth" (In 1:14). The incarnate Glory of God would atone for the sins of the world by his death on the cross [p. 49-50] - Commentary: The opening chapter affords Ezekiel, the prophet-priest, a vision into the opened heavens of the enthroned Glory of God. Thus the book of ation the apostle John sees through the opened heavens the enthroned Christ and the divine liturgy of the heavenly host. In particular, Revelation 4 recalls Ezekiel 1, down to the details of the mysterious creatures who support the divine throne in heaven.

As we ponder this most mysterious prophetic book, then, we bear in mind that the realities we strive to understand through Ezekiel's eyes find their fulfillment in Jesus Christ. The vision of divine Glory in chapter 1, though it transcends human comprehension, reveals the divine Glory to be manifested in the God-man, Christ our Lord. Likewise, when Yahweh speaks throughout the rest of the book (beginning in Ch 2), the words can rightly be regarded as those of Christ, the Word made flesh

This is similar to the traditional phrasing of the Collect for the Word in TLH: Blessed Lord, who hast caused all Holy Scriptures to be written for our learning, grant that we p. 112-113) - Commentary on Ezekiel 3:1: The main point of the scene ... is that Yahweh will protect his prophet from the fierce opposition to God's Word that he will nave to face. The scroll is God's Word in an external, physical ("sacramental") form that the prophet must ingest if he is to carry out the formidable task ahead of him. The part of the collect about inwardly digesting the Scriptures is based on this episode in Ezekiel. We might compare Ezekiel's ingestion and digestion of the Word in scroll form to the way in which in the Lord's Supper the Word made flesh is received by mouth and ingested to permeate the body of the communicant, who is a member of Christ's one body (1 Cor 10:16-27). may in such wise hear them, read, mark, learn, and inwardly digest them...

n LW (p 156) and LSB (p 265), "inwardly digest them" was altered to "take them to heart." The change removes us one step from the language of Scripture. The increasng biblical illiteracy of modern worshipers may render the origin of the phrase less obvious. But, if so, it provides a standing opportunity for the pastor to instruct the congregation about the origin of the liturgy in the Bible itself.
