A Message from Pastor Abatelli

Clichés are often used among Christians. When people are in pain, have a problem or struggling these phrases at times seem to put our foot in our mouths. They can be hurtful. Often it's done with good intentions, but the good doesn't cover up the pain of our words.

We as Christians need to stop saying them because they can, and do more harm than good. This article is meant to help watch our words and offer help of what we can do instead. If we feel we have done these before, please know God does forgive us in Jesus, who took our sins away. Jesus rose and gave us the Holy Spirit to empower us to say healing words of hope in Jesus.

"Pray More"

When people express their problems, grief, or pain some people say, "Pray more." Or "What you need to do when that comes is pray." This seems like good advice but it offers not healing or hope. The same is for the phrase, "Just read the Bible." It puts the problem, grief, or pain back on the person hurting. It is like saying to someone standing with a bad broken leg who can't walk and in pain, "Hold these suitcases too." We are laying more problems on top of them, giving no relief and saying in this quick fix phrase, "Not my problem."

God calls us to bear each other's burden (Col. 3:13). Pray for them and don't forget to do it. Even pray for them right there if needed. Prayer is powerful, but someone who is hurting feels like he has no power. Bring up God's comfort. Tell them of God's grace and presence even if they feel like life is a mess. Give a helpful verse and expand on it. The Lord is my light and my salvation- whom shall I fear? The Lord is the stronghold of my life- of whom shall I be afraid? Psalms 27:1. Tell them in this verse God is saying, "He is our light and salvation our stronghold in life so we don't need to be afraid. God has you. And what better hands to have

us than the ones that were scarred because of His love for us."

We are even called to do more than just pray. Are they sick? Maybe they need some soup. Just got laid off? Maybe extra cash to pay some bills. A new mom overwhelmed with a baby? Offer to help do their laundry or clean their house.

"Everyone is struggling with that issue too."

We may be familiar with its cousin, "Everyone has that problem too." We may be trying to empathize, but come across as insulting - telling people to toughen up, quick being a wimp, and even minimizing their problem.

I never liked this response since I met a girl who was suicidal. There was another man with me and that person said, "Everyone struggles and has that problem." The issues it creates is that we may not be struggling like her and we don't really know the entire story or what is in her heart. It comes across as condescending, that her problem is nothing important and she is weak. That pushed that suicidal girl to feel weaker. For what she heard was, "If all struggle with this issue and everyone is doing fine, they are stronger than me. I am weak and can't do it." I remember raising my voice telling the person that was not right, and told the girl that God was her strength even if she did not feel it. I then proceeded to gather her allies in the battle against her struggle from counseling, an elder, and even robed up in my Alb to give forgiveness at the altar. We can even pray for them (see Pray More).

"Don't Worry, God Has a Plan"

Avoid like the plague. God does have a plan, but in the midst of the battle of pain this is the last thing people want to hear in a time of crisis. In any tragedy, pain or problem, the magic words, "Don't worry, God has a plan" does not help.

(Pastor Abatelli's message continued.)

A pastor did a funeral for a mother who overdosed on drugs. She left behind three children. Telling them God has a plan does not help. It is not a magic word that makes the pain disappear. This phrase comes across as, "You're doing your pain or grief wrong. Don't worry." This is even harder to say that phrase when more than 250 Nigerian girls are abducted from a school in the middle of the night.

They need help and comfort now in the battle of grief and agony. This help or comfort comes alongside mothers and fathers weeping, grieving a loss and seeking justice. God wants us to comfort those in the midst of the tragedies giving hope. The three children who lost their mother were in pain. The pastor stopped the service, got down on his knees in front of these tear filled children and prayed. He gave them a cross made from the LWML group to assure them of their mother's hope in Jesus. He battled for them in their pain.

There are more phrases Christians should avoid. But all in all, listen, listen, listen. Keay Nigel, an <u>ex-Christian</u>, said, "I wish people were more patient and showed more interest in what I was going through, instead of what they thought I was going through. Lend a listening ear. Don't be too quick to judge or give advice. Listen first."

Show Jesus and His love. Reba Riley said, "If you love them, LOVE them. Love them by suspending your judgment and certainties. Love them by talking less and listening more. Love them by offering a hand to hold, a hug, a number to call when they need to talk."

The Bookkeeper's Corner

I was recently asked a great question: "If we don't contribute enough money each month to meet our building mortgage obligation (\$14,135/month), how is the difference made up so we don't fall into arrears"? The answer goes back to how the loan was originally set up.

On the 1st or 2nd of every month, 100% of your building fund contributions are added up and sent to the Church Extension Fund (CEF). CEF deposits that check into an investment account where it immediately starts earning interest. On the 20th of the month, CEF withdraws the principal and interest from that investment fund and applies against the mortgage.

If our check is over \$14,135, the difference keeps earning interest as it sits in the investment account. If our check is short, CEF pulls the excess money that's sitting in the fund and pays the mortgage. As of this writing, we have \$52,874.53 in our investment account, so we have a cushion when we don't meet our mortgage obligation through offerings.

I mentioned in a previous article that our congregation meets the \$14,135 payment about 60% of the time. If we could meet our obligation 100% of the time, we could afford to make a special principal-only payment which not only reduces the principal, but affects the total amount of interest paid.

Genesis 14 tells a story about Abram's return from defeating the armies of the four kings, rescuing his nephew Lot, and reclaiming his possessions when he's met by an enigmatic priest named Melchizedek. The priest attributes Abram's victory to God—and he blesses Abram. In gratitude to God's authority and blessing, Abram gives Melchizedek a tenth of his possessions. He doesn't do it to *invoke* God's blessing; he does it in *response* to God's blessing. Something to think about!

If it were possible to turn back the clock and expunge misleading renditions from our Bibles, this would surely be the place to start. It indisputably is one of the major culprits in reinforcing the stubborn prejudice that somehow the Old Testament is more legalistic. ... The word means someing of His demand in the covenant—and in the promises attached to it. "Word of God" is often a superb equivalent of Torah as parallel examples in Hebrew Title of the Books - The Hebrew name for the Books of Moses is "Torah." (The Greek title is "Pentateuch"). The conventional translation of "Torah" with poetry show (Is 2.3 and Mi 4.2 and examples in Ps 119 and Dt.).
