Devotion Number One for Week of Feb. 11, 2013	Matthew 23:23 Woe to you, scribes and Pharisees, hypocrites! For you tithe the mint and dill and cumin and have neglected the weightier matters of the law: justice, mercy and faithfulness. These you ought to have done without neglecting the others.	Wow! Jesus does not mince any words. Jesus is not angry with the people for tithing (giving ten percent of their income), but He is angry with the way some people are giving! They are careful to give ten percent of their garden herbs (mint, dill and cumin) but they do not understand the importance of giving themselves to Jesus and His people. They are willing to give of their most valuable herbs (mint and cumin were so valuable, they were actually taxed in those days), but they are not willing to be merciful (kind, forgiving and loving) to others. God does not just want ten percent of their garden seeds; He wants one hundred percent of them. He wants them to understand all of His Word rather than thinking they are doing everything He expects of them by simply giving some of the seeds they have grown. He wants them to live by the Gospel rather than just religiously try to keep the Law. The message for us is clear and unmistakable. Jesus wants us to give ten percent of our valuable earnings, but even more important to Him is that we be loving and compassionate toward others. Jesus would not want us to think we are fully committed to Him and doing all He has asked us to do simply because we give Him one dollar out of every ten dollars we earn. Jesus wants and deserves our whole heart. When Jesus lives in our hearts it will show in all of our actions and attitudes as we love and forgive others and as we joyfully give Him at least ten percent of the one hundred percent He has given us!	Lord, Help me to understand what You want me to do with the many blessings You have given me. Help me to joyfully share them with others. Create in me a heart filled with mercy that is faithful to You! Help me to forgive others the way You have forgiven me. In Your Name I pray. Amen
Devotion Number Two for Week of Feb. 11, 2013	I Corinthians 13:3 If I give away all I have, and if I deliver up my body to be burned, but have not love, I gain nothing.	It is believed the phrase "deliver up my body to be burned" is referring to those early Christians who were martyred—people who were burned to death because they refused to deny their belief in the one true God. It is kind of amazing then that our Lord would tell us that even if we give away everything we have (not just a portion of it, but all of it) and even if we die rather than deny our beliefs, we gain nothing if we do not have love. Perhaps the key to unlocking this puzzling statement is found by reading I John 4:8. "Anyone who does not love does not know God, because God is love." Love is certainly the most fitting way to describe God. It was love for us that motivated God to give His Son to save us. Everything that God does for us, He does out of love—even when we do not like His choices, it is done out of love for us. Hebrews 12:6 reminds us that the Lord "disciplines those He loves." The first gift God wants to receive from us is love. The greatest gift we can share with each other as a body of believers is love. A gift is not a true gift unless it is given in love. Once we begin to catch a glimpse of how much God truly loves us, our heart willingly, joyfully and lovingly wants to respond with gifts of love for God's work and God's people.	Lord Jesus, I cannot imagine what it would be like to give away everything I have. I have never really had to suffer because I believe in You. Fill my heart, Lord, with that kind of bold love for You so that I would be ready and willing to do whatever You asked me to do. In Your Name I pray. Amen

We can never pay for our sins. We are not perfect. We cannot become perfect. It is too late. We were born sinful and we will die sinful. We can be perfectly forgiven and we are. Christ came, died and rose to remove every one of our sins. When we sincerely think about that, our heart swells with joy and thanksgiving. Our heart moves our hands and we become willing givers! Someone once said people should give till it hurts. Jesus wants us to give until it feels good. Giving is just one more way God gives us joy! Devotion Number Four for Week of Feb. 18, 2013	Acts 20:35 In all things I have shown you that by working hard in this way we must help the weak and remember the words of the Lord Jesus, how he, himself said, "It is more blessed to give than to receive."	The weak are those who cannot support themselves because of sickness, age or some type of injury. God wants us to work hard so that we are able to help our weaker brothers and sisters. Paul invites us to remember the words of Christ and do what He has directed us to do. Although these words are not recorded in any of the four Gospels, they are genuinely the words of Christ. They characterize the very nature of Jesus. Jesus lived these words and wants us to do the same. When we care for those who are not able to take care of themselves, we do to others what Christ did for us. We could not take away our sins. He worked hard to do that for us. Now, always with joy, we can do for others what has been done for us! Truly, it is more blessed to give than to receive! We can believe it because Jesus taught it.	Lord Jesus, the world teaches us to get all we can. You teach us that it is more blessed to give than to receive. Help us to live what You have taught us. In Your Name we pray. Amen
Devotion Number Five for Week of Feb. 25, 2013	Proverbs 11:24-25 One gives freely, yet grows all the richer; another withholds what he should give, and only suffers want. Whoever brings blessing will be enriched and one who waters will himself be watered.	It makes no sense, but it does make cents! Here God tells us to do something that does not make sense. He tells us to freely give away things and then promises we will get richer. This is one of those many times our God is telling us to trust Him—to take Him at His Word. He also tells us that if we do not give and freely share, we will suffer want. When God tells us things that do not make sense to us, we are wise to follow His words. We will always find them to be true. When we take Him at His Word, follow His lead, He is able to teach us and we are able to discover, learn and live a life that truly matters—a life that makes us a blessing. The reference to water in this passage is written about those desert people who desperately needed water for themselves and their animals. It had to do with their irrigating. To share water with others was to give away the very thing that could make the difference between life and death—for themselves and their crops and animals. Here our Lord again says something that makes no sense, but is TRUE and can be TRUSTED. He says the one who shares his water, will be watered. God wants us not only to share our surplus with others, but also to share those things that are most vital to us. God wants us to recognize Him as our Provider and to trust Him to supply all our needs. When we do that, we are able to share freely. We are able to be a blessing and we can expect to be blessed by our Almighty God. It may not make sense, but it does make cents...the more we give away, the more we will have.	Lord, How can this be? How can we freely give things away and still prosper? Even though we may not understand this, Lord, help us to follow Your Words. When we do Your will, You bless us. Help us to trust Your Word. Help us to trust You to always keep Your Word. In Your Name we pray. Amen
Devotion Number Six for Week of Feb. 25, 2013	Matthew 6:19-21 ... but lay up for yourselves treasures in heaven, where neither moth nor rust destroys and where thieves do not break in and steal.	Everything on this earth will one day be destroyed. Bright, firm, red apples turn to a smelly pile of mush. Beautiful, expensive, powerful vehicles become a bundle of scrap metal. One out of control flame can suddenly melt a mansion into a pile of ashes. Nothing on this earth lasts forever. God does have a plan for His children so that they will truly live forever. That will happen in heaven where we will encounter the gold streets and the prepared mansions God has promised us. The treasures of heaven will not be earned; they are simply given to us out of love. Devotion Number Seven for Week of March 3, 2013	Luke 12:34 For where your treasure is, there will your heart be also.	Someone once said you could discover much about a person by simply looking at their checkbook register and their credit card statements. Most everyone pays for utilities, house and car payments and of course taxes, but we also make many choices with every dollar that is entrusted to our care. Some people buy lots of books, others value expensive clothing. Some families prefer McDonalds or Taco Bell while others would prefer Lucky's or Uno's. Sometimes we are even unaware of how much we are spending on some of our favorites. Some people enjoy being generous to particular organizations that value what is important to them. Some have a heart for taking care of animals or orphans while others will be passionate about fighting cancer or heart disease or making sure Hospice care is available. The causes or organizations we support are often chosen because they have gained access to our heart by the way they have cared for someone or something we love. The more we think about this, the more we realize Luke 12:34 is true! The way we spend the money God entrusts to us, tells us a lot about where our heart is. Perhaps it is a time for us to take a look at our credit card statements and checkbook ledgers with God's eyes. God wants His children to be warm and well fed and to relax and have fun, but God also wants more than that for His children. God wants His children to have a joy filled heart because they are investing in the things that matter most to Him. So, be brave, take a look and ask yourself, "Where is my heart?" Chances are most of us will have some adjustments to make, but we cannot make those adjustments until we look at our lives through the truthful eyes of Luke 12:34.	Lord, Be with me as I look at my heart—the heart in which You live—the heart that guides so many choices in my life. Send me Your Holy Spirit so that I might have the wisdom, to make Godly choices with my treasures. In Your Name I pray. Amen.
Devotion Number Eight for Week of March 10, 2013	I Timothy 6:17-19 As for the rich in this present age, charge them not to be haughty, not to set their hopes on the uncertainty of riches, but on God who richly provides us with everything to enjoy. They are to do good, to be rich in good works, to be generous and ready to share, thus storing up treasure for themselves as a good foundation for the future, so that they may take hold of that which is truly life.	The early Christian churches had quite a few members who were from the upper, wealthier classes. These people were already rich in terms of worldly possessions. Paul is not talking about people who want to become rich. He is also not talking about people who are spiritually rich. He is talking directly to people who have an accumulation of wealth on this earth. Paul instructs them to remain humble rather than using their riches as bragging rights. He also reminds them not to place their hope in the uncertainty of their earthly wealth since that can change suddenly. Instead, Paul invites us to place our hope in God who is the source, the provider of their many possessions. Paul reminds them to use their wealth for a good purpose—to become rich in good works! Whenever God blesses us with riches, He does so for a purpose. He will also provide us with opportunities to use those riches for the good of others so we can discover true treasure. Notice the phrase "take hold" of that which is truly life. For many the "good life", riches and all their privileges always seem to be just beyond their reach. No matter how hard they try, they are not able to quite grasp it. In this passage, our Lord reminds us to realize His treasures have already been promised to us. They have already been handed to us. Now we are to hold fast to them—hang onto them—fight to keep them while we await the treasures of heaven,	Lord, Help me to put my trust in You rather than any riches You may have given me. Help me to use my riches for a good purpose so that I, too, can take hold of the good life You want me to have. In Your Name I pray. Amen

No one deserves to be robbed, but God especially should never be robbed. The Lord had commanded His people to give a tenth of their income to the support of the Levites (the priests) as a contribution to the Lord. In other words the gift was to the Lord even though it was being used to support those who were working in the church. What makes this even more interesting is that God told them to do that even though some of the Levite priests were not performing their duties very well. God wants the ministry of the Word to be preserved! God lets them know how serious He is about this by cursing them with a curse. God then says something that He says nowhere else in all of Scripture, "put me to the test". While it is unusual for God to challenge His people in this way, He is totally sincere. So, have you taken the challenge? Have you given your tithes and offerings? If you have, you know God is sincere about opening the windows of heaven and pouring His blessings on you. If you have not taken the challenge, please know God might just be trying to get your attention so that He can pour out His abundant blessings on you.</p>	<p>have kept every promise You have ever given. For they gave according to their means, as I can testify, and beyond their means, of their own accord, begging us earnestly for the favor of taking part in the relief of the saints and this, not as we expected, but they gave themselves first to the Lord and then by the will of God to us.</p>	<p>The Macedonians had it right! They had truly discovered the joy of giving and were even begging to give more. What would make people beg to give? They were not giving a mere ten percent. They gave according to what they were able to give and even more than they should have been able to give. One thing is certain. Their needs were met. The God who they worshiped with their offerings would bless them again and again. They had discovered the joy of helping their fellow saints. They understood what it truly meant to be brothers and sisters in Christ. How could they do this? They gave themselves FIRST to God and then to their fellow Christians. They did this during a severe test of affliction. Even when everything was going wrong, they were doing the right thing. Because of that they still had joy—the joy that no man or situation can ever take from them. Likewise, they must have also had that peace that passes understanding. They had a choice. They could have looked at their situation and grumbled and complained. They could have been angry with God because they were facing some tough situations, but they did not. Instead, they faced each day with faith in God, and because of that they had something that some of the richest people on earth do not have—they had abundant JOY. May we learn from them, so that what was said of them might be said of us! God has lots of joy to give to us. All we need to do is trust Him!</p>	<p>Lord, fill me with faith. Fill me with joy! This shall be yours of</p>	<p>The tabernacle (place of worship) in the Old Testament was a combination of a church, a slaughterhouse and an open air kitchen. Each day the priests sacrificed animals and grain offerings. When people brought their personal offerings of animals and grain and any other items they were giving to God, the priests were in charge of offering up these sacrifices. The priests were not given land on which to grow grain or to feed animals. The priests were to be supported from the offerings the people brought. They were not allowed to eat the burnt offerings—they were strictly for God. The priests were allowed to have a portion of the other offerings. The portions they were allowed to have were very specific. The portions were to provide for their needs, not to make them wealthy. If we planted grass seed, grass would grow. God wants us to know our actions have consequences. If we sow seeds of obedience, God will bless them. If we ignore God and live a life of disobedience, we will reap the consequences of that life. Sometimes it is easy for us to grow weary of doing good, of making unselfish decisions, of giving rather than taking. <p>Devotion Number Thirteen for Week of March 31, 2013</p>	<p>I Timothy 5:17-18 Let the elders who rule well be considered worthy of double honor, especially those who labor in preaching and teaching. For the Scripture says, "You shall not muzzle an ox when it treads out the grain," and, "The laborer deserves his wages."</p>	<p>In this passage the word "elder" is referring to those people in the early church who were overseers—those men who were actively leading and directing the church. God's Word tells us these men should receive "double honor." They are to receive respectful honor and they are also to receive an honorarium or compensation for what they do to make it possible for others to hear and learn God's Word. The elders in our church today are the overseers and active leaders in directing our body of believers. The elders in our church do not receive an honorarium or any kind of compensation for the many hours they spend making it possible for us to share the Good News of Jesus Christ. The elders do take on the responsibility of making sure that those who actively preach and teach God's Word are properly compensated. They know God believes His laborers deserve a wage just as the Levite priests did in the Old Testament times. Thanks be to God for the godly men God has chosen to be our leaders at St. Paul Lutheran. Thanks be to God for the many honorable people who make it possible for the Lord's workers to receive their wages. God expects it. We do it. God blesses it.</p>	<p>Lord, help us to treasure and honor the elders you have given us. Help us to work with them to make certain that God's Word is preached in its truth and purity in our church and that those who do the Lord's work would be fairly compensated. In Your Name we pray. People were always looking for him and when they saw "the king" it brought them joy and peace to know Elvis was "still alive". Jesus is not someone simply called "the king", He is the King of Kings and Lord of Lords! Jesus really is alive! Then they will also answer, saying, "Lord, when did we see you hungry or thirsty or a stranger or naked or sick or in prison, and did not minister to you?" Then he will answer them saying, "Truly, I say to you, as you did not do it to one of the least of these, you did not do it to me."</p>	<p>He is everywhere. No matter where you go, Jesus is there ahead of You, behind You and hopefully in you.</p> <p>This section of Scripture makes it clear though that if you really want to "see" Jesus, you should look in hospitals, prisons, nursing homes, homeless shelters and under bridges and overpasses. Jesus can easily be spotted in the life of anyone who has a need. Jesus becomes "visible" when one of His followers shows His love and does His work. Jesus comes alive in the hearts and minds of His followers in specific actions rather than specific places. We would probably never have figured all that out except that He told us in these passages of His living Word!</p> <p>If you are looking to spot Jesus today, there is no need to head out to the nearest overpass, just look into the eyes of the nearest passerby which might well be someone in your own family. Your son or daughter might need someone to pray with them or play with them. Your mother might be lonely and need a phone call or a hug. Your wife needs someone to notice the trash should be taken out to the road. Your neighbor needs a friendly hello or his driveway shoveled or his hand shook. Look for Jesus everywhere and you will find Him and the joy of living the giving life by being His hands and feet.</p> <p>So, who will you be when Jesus meets you to evaluate your life? Will you be amongst the confused that never saw the opportunities to serve others because you were too busy serving yourself? Will you be among those who spent their lives joyfully giving joy and hope to others by helping to provide for their needs? The good news for all of us is that our lives are not over. No matter what decisions we have made in the past, Jesus has given us a new day with new opportunities to learn from our past, to make changes in our lives and then DO what He has asked us to do. All of us always have something to give and when we give it, we see our King!</p>

Dear Brothers and Sisters in Christ,

When a dying friend has a request, we do our very best to honor that request. We see it as a way to show them love and respect and let them know how very much we love them.

Jesus is not just any dying friend. He is the Friend who died for us. Most dying people do not have a choice. Jesus did. He chose to die for us, for our sins. He has a request. It is the very same request He made of His disciples in the Garden of Gethsemane. As He spent those final days and hours before His crucifixion, He was very aware of the pain and the hatred He would be facing. When we are facing hard times, we want our friends nearby. Jesus was no exception. It was for this reason He asked His disciples, His closest friends to come with Him to the Garden while He prayed. They went with Him but promptly fell asleep. When Jesus found the disciples asleep, He asked Peter, “So, could you not watch with me one hour?”

Our dying but also risen Lord and Savior is asking you, His disciple, a similar question, “Could you watch one hour with Me?” During this time of Lent, it is important for us to spend extra time with our Savior so that we can carefully study His Word and come to a greater understanding of what His death and resurrection means for us. How will it change us? How will it change everything?

The enclosed mini Bible lessons are designed to give you two extra opportunities per week to read a portion of God’s Holy Word and to apply it to your life, so that together we might all see how an all giving Christ can teach us to live the giving life—the joy filled life He wants to give us. You can do them whenever you want—by yourself or with your family. They are portable. You can take them to work and read them at a break. You can read them in the morning when you wake up or before you say your bedtime prayers. Think of it as Jesus trying to communicate with you.

So, how will you answer Him when He asks, “Could you watch one hour with Me?”
