A Message from Pastor

Dear Brothers and Sisters in Christ,

Spring has sprung. It is a time of new life and new growth. A time of birds chirping, flowers blooming, and tree leaves unfurling.

We are still in the season of Easter as well. A time in the Church Year where we remember and celebrate the new life and new growth we have through faith in our risen Lord and Savior, Jesus Christ. A time of singing praises to God, our faith blooming, and our good works unfurling for all the world to see.

As you know, our theme is *Equip. Build. Grow. Together.* based on Ephesians 4:11-16. Since we're in the season where things are growing and flourishing, we will focus on growing up in every way into Christ and flourishing in His kingdom.

Let's consider Psalm 92. Psalm 92 is a psalm for the Sabbath, a day of rest and worship for Israel. "It is good to give thanks to the LORD, to sing praises to Your name, O Most High; to declare Your steadfast love in the morning, and Your faithfulness by night" (Psalm 92:1-2). This proclamation sets a positive tone for the whole psalm and is a worthy reminder of the value of worship.

However, it's verses 12-15 I want to focus on. They read: "The righteous flourish like the palm tree and grow like a cedar in Lebanon. They are planted in the house of the LORD; they flourish in the courts of our God. They still bear fruit in old age; they are ever full of sap and green, to declare that the LORD is upright; He is my rock, and there is no unrighteousness in Him."

The palm and cedar trees are two important trees in Israel. The cedar of Lebanon is referred to frequently throughout the Old Testament as a symbol of strength. The psalmist adds to the picture of the flourishing of righteousness by asserting that they still produce fruit, even in old age, and that they are always green and full of sap. Age is no obstacle to growing in Christ, flourishing in His kingdom, and bearing fruit. Each of us are able, by the Holy Spirit's power, to grow, flourish, and bear fruit all our days.

But we're only able to do so because we are planted in the house of the Lord, in the courts of our God. Such imagery is common in the Bible. After all, the picture of paradise is a magnificent garden, filled with God's presence as seen in both Genesis 1-3 and in Revelation 21-22. The flourishing of the righteous is thus rooted in the presence of God.

This psalm also invites us to think about flourishing in God's presence forever. In our daily lives, we see that righteousness doesn't always flourish. Some suffer more than others. Yes, we experience God's presence now, but not in the fullest, that is yet to come. We flourish now in the house of the Lord, but we look forward to our own Easter Day on the Last Day, when we will praise God in His presence evermore.

Perhaps this is where the Sabbath connection of the psalm comes in. In Jewish tradition, the Sabbath was understood as a symbol of the perfect rest to come. The book of Hebrews picks up on this idea of Sabbath as something to be fulfilled only in God's kingdom (See Hebrews 3:7-4:11). Proclaiming this psalm, then, is an act of faith — of faith in all the promises of Easter. We declare God's steadfast love and faithfulness, growing in Christ and flourishing in His kingdom, while we wait for its promise of the flourishing of the righteous yet to be fulfilled.

Our mission statement encourages us to "share the Word of Christ to all". In order to do that well, you need to be planted in the house of the Lord often; you need to be in God's house to receive His good gifts. If you are rooted in the Lord, you will bear fruit, regardless of your age; you will be a child of God, ever full of sap and green. God's promises for those faithfully planted in His house are too many to be named. But three I will name are: (1) you will grow in Christ, (2) you will flourish in His kingdom, and (3) you will, with Easter joy in your heart, produce fruit, namely sharing the Word of Christ to all.

I encourage you to invite someone to a worship service this month (and every month). It is the primary way they will become rooted in the presence of God. Invite and let God take care of the rest, giving thanks for the fruit God bears in your life. And by God's grace, they will grow in Christ and flourish in His kingdom as well.

AS THE HEAD OF THE FAMILY SHOULD TEACH THEM . . . God's Word in the Christian Home

Dad, you have an awesome responsibility from God. God wants His Word to be learned not only in our churches and schools but especially in our homes: "You shall teach (My words) diligently to your children, and shall talk of them when you sit in your house." Deuteronomy 6:7. The apostles taught fathers to view this as one of their primary responsibilities: "Fathers, do not provoke your children to anger, but bring them up in the discipline and instruction of the Lord." Ephesians 6:4.

Increasingly, however, Christians have not grown up with any Bible learning in the home or much talk about God. They are not sure where to start. It is not surprising that the rise of the Nones (those who do not indicate any church affiliation) has coincided with the decline in congregational and home worship. Three things especially encourage us to take up this godly work:

First, we live in grace. God is happy with you for Jesus' sake. Many people shy away from home devotions because their guilt over their prayer life or for having skipped church for a while prevents them from making a start. But, Christians are pleasing to the Father, not because their prayers are not good enough or they have not been faithful attenders, but because Jesus' blood covers all their sins.

Second, realize that God commands this and that whatever God commands is good and wise. God placed the father as the head of the household. That is not just the person who makes daily decisions, but the person who is the spiritual head of the house. You, dad, are to lead your family in the faith. It is not as hard as you might think. Jesus promises that His words will be enough for us to withstand all things. Bible time in the home requires modest effort and sacrifice, but it is eternally worth it for you and for those you love.

Third, know that God has attached great promises to His Word for preserving and sharing faith. The biblical formula for passing on the faith from one generation to the next is simple: Learn the Word of God by weekly attendance at the Divine Service and by daily Bible learning in the home, Sunday School, VBS, youth groups, even the Pastor's confirmation classes for youth and adults are all wonderful aids. The most important spiritual powerhouse is congregational and family worship. When this is done, children are less likely to leave the faith when they are grown. "Train up a child in the way he should go; even when he is old he will not depart from it." Proverbs 22:6.

Beware of two obstacles. First, if you are just getting started, know that it will probably feel awkward at first. All new habits are strange at first. But you will become more comfortable with it as you make home devotions a regular part of your day. Give at least three months for the power of the habit to kick in.

Second, people naturally ask what resources they should use. Our church produces more resources than ever before, such as Portals of Prayer (found in the narthex), the Treasury of Daily Prayer, a book called 120 Bible Stories (available from Concordia Publishing House) is great for beginners, and of course the Bible with the Psalms and daily lectionary found in our church newsletter. Luther's Small Catechism is also a great resource simply by using its question and answer readings complete with proof texts to underscore the answers. Finally, reading the verses of hymns from the hymnal are a great way to reinforce the church year along with faith and praise to the Lord.

God's Word is our great heritage and makes for the happiest life (Psalm 119:111). Whether you are single, busy with children, empty nesters or widowed, it is the blessed hope of heaven and being forever with Christ that brings happiness and joy into our life.

Proof Is in the Scriptures

For I delivered to you as of first importance what I also received: that Christ died for our sins in accordance with the Scriptures, that He was buried, that He was raised on the third day in accordance with the Scriptures. 1 Cor. 15:3-4

The Spirt of God uses the Word of Grace, foretold in the Scriptures, to create faith in the crucified, buried and risen Jesus Christ. And so we say, "I believe that I cannot by my own reason or strength believe in Jesus Christ, my Lord, or come to Him; but the Holy Spirit has called me by the Gospel, enlightened me with His gifts, sanctified and kept me in the true faith.¹

Here you notice how Paul adduces Scripture as his strongest proof, for there is no other enduring way of preserving our doctrine and our faith than the physical or written Word, poured into letters and preached orally by him or others; for here we find it stated clearly: "Scripture! Scripture!"

The Time of Easter - Easter and Its Season

Easter is not merely a one-day celebration; it is a fifty-day season from the Day of the Resurrection of Our Lord to the Day of Pentecost. This extended season-one seventh of the year-is a victory celebration, a time for all Christians to proclaim boldly their faith in a risen and victorious Savior.

The first celebration of Easter is the Easter Vigil, the evening of Holy Saturday. The Vigil includes a service of light, in which fire symbolizes Jesus as the light of the world. The service is designed to take the Christian from the solemnity of Good Friday to the predawn joy of Easter.

Easter is the richest and most lavishly celebrated festival of the Church Year. Congregations may hold a sunrise service, commemorating the surprise of the women visiting the empty tomb of Christ, as well as services that celebrate the resurrection of Jesus Christ. While not as lavish, this joyous and celebratory tone echoes down through the Sundays of the Easter season.

Forty days after Easter, the Church celebrates the Ascension of Our Lord, who ascended into heaven not only as God, but also as man. The final Sunday of the Easter season, celebrated as Pentecost, was adopted by early Christians to commemorate the first great harvest of believers for Christ. Thus, Pentecost is the birthday of the Christian Church, as the Holy spirit came upon the disciples and they gave their compelling witness about the resurrected Lord. The color for the Day of Pentecost is red, representing fire and blood. Red recalls the tongues of fire received on the first Pentecost and the martyrs who shed their blood for the faith.

During Easter, we rejoice in our salvation.

Easter Practices and Traditions

- The colors of Easter are white and gold. White, the color of our Lord's holiness, is everywhere on Easter, from the paraments and vestments, to the traditional Easter lilies. Gold decorations remind us that our resurrection life in Christ is precious and eternal.
- After a long absence in Lent, *Alleluia* returns at Easter and is heard everywhere in the propers appointed for the weeks after Easter. Also, the joyous Hymn of Praise and the Gloria Patri return and are sung as part of the liturgy once again.
- During the Easter season, we greet one another with a special Easter Greeting and response: "Alleluia! Christ is risen!"
 "He is risen indeed! Alleluia!"
