A Message from Pastor

The Feast of Weeks

You shall count seven weeks. Begin to count the seven weeks from the time the sickle is first put to the standing grain. Then you shall keep the Feast of Weeks to the LORD your God with the tribute of a freewill offering from your hand, which you shall give as the LORD your God blesses you. And you shall rejoice before the LORD your God, you and your son and your daughter, your male servant and your female servant, the Levite who is within your towns, the sojourner, the fatherless, and the widow who are among you, at the place that the LORD your God will choose, to make his name dwell there. (Deuteronomy 16:9-11 ESV)

In Old Testament Israel, farmers put their sickles to the standing grain about April 5 on our calendar; seven weeks after that would be about May 24. This 50-day interval seems to have stretched from the beginning of the barley harvest to the end of the wheat harvest. Seven weeks allowed for a variation in the time needed for grain to ripen from year

The Feast of Weeks is also called the Feast of Harvest (Exodus 23:16) and the Day of along the edge of the field (Leviticus 23:22). one who has been entrusted with much,

much more will be asked" (Luke 12:48 NIV). By sharing what God has given you, you show your trust in His generosity. He also promises through Jesus, that you will receive many times more than you give, in this age and in the age to come (Luke 18:18-30).

This has been a difficult and challenging year for many in the agricultural field. Please know the LORD hears your cries and has not abandoned you. But did you notice that, regardless of the size of the harvest, God expected a freewill offering from the first fruits? No specific amount or percentage was given by God. And yet, we are to "give as the LORD your God blesses you". St. Paul echoes this in 2 Corinthians 9:7: "Each person should give what they have decided in their heart to give, not reluctantly or under compulsion, for God loves a cheerful giver".

So regardless of your vocation or station in life, reflect on how the LORD your God blesses you. Remember a time when you may have been a child, or an employee, or a sojourner in a strange place, or fatherless and/or motherless, or a widow/widower. Remember what it felt like to have no voice, no control, no connection, no hope. Then rejoice before the LORD your God for all the blessings He's given you, especially for the forgiveness, life, and salvation we have in Jesus; even in a season of uncertainty and hardship, rejoice! Offer the first fruits from your "grain harvest" as an act that expresses thanksgiving, trust, and devotion to the LORD. Pray for the Holy Spirit to embolden you to be generous to all, but especially to those who suffer need.

God **is** Lord of the harvest. In His divine timing, He will bless us and provide for all we need to support this body and life. Who better to trust with our earthly riches, however great or little they may be, then to the LORD our God, from whom all blessings come? Rejoice! Pray! And Give Thanks! For the LORD our God, the God of the harvest, has done, and continues to do, marvelous things.

Firstfruits (Numbers 28:26). This important feast in Israel's history was later called Pentecost because Jews observed it on the 50th day following the Sabbath that began Passover. Not long after the Feast of Weeks was the offering of the first fruits from the grain harvest, an act that expressed thanksgiving, trust, and devotion to the LORD. Israelites could also show their gratitude to the LORD by letting the poor and foreigner in the land take the grain left by the harvesters God commands His people to remember their blessings and to share from their bounty with those in need. When God has given us much, He asks much from us. Our Lord Jesus Christ said, "From everyone who has been given much, much will be demanded; and from the

The Bookeeper's Corner

A congregational meeting was held on Sunday, September 15, 2019 to show the congregation our financial situation three years ago, today, and where we are heading. The intent was to demonstrate we are not only heading into a deficit situation, but we continue to spend more than we earn.

The congregation was asked to come up with any and all suggestions that the Boards could address: either increase income, decrease expense, or a combination. Here are the suggestions:

1) Refer to congressional survey from district

2) How do we get rid of church/school divide? School budget, in totality, as part of general budget? Tuition, fees, designated funds.

3) Revisit the constitutional change of Trust and Investment

4) Take T & I investment funds to pay off mortgage;

building fund monies go into general fund

5) Talk to family of school drama fund to see if it can be

Revisit public school teachers vs head count

Do financial review of church books per by laws Have school pay specific percentage of utilities

9) Continue to refine member roster to reflect actual membership

10) Attack lack of income by educating congregation

11) Capital Campaign

12) Combine grades with less than 15 kids and release applicable employees

13) Handle registration to motivate parents to register in June

14) Increase line of credit

15) Revisit health care plans

16) Employees pay part / all of their benefits

17) Evaluate student/teacher ratio in upper grades and adjust staff accordingly

18) Evaluate need for two school secretaries

Evaluate need for two custodians

20) Evaluate tuition rates

21) Look into "Everyone His Witness" from Synod grów the congregation

Each of these tasks have been handed out to the applicable boards to address and their responses will be available at the Voter's assembly in December as well as the December Messenger. The actual value of the suggestions will be evaluated and incorporated into the CY2020 budget, which you will see at the Voter's Assembly in December for approval.

Convention Report

Report of the 67th Regular Convention of The Lutheran Church Missouri Synod (Continued)

Prepared for the Frankenmuth Circuit of The Michigan District By Pastoral Delegate Dan Burhop and Lay Delegate Steven Kern "Joy:Fully Lutheran: Rejoice, Pray, Give Thanks"

Floor Committee #5 – Theology and Church Relations

Res. 5-07 To clarify the relationship with a number of our partner churches and the Lutheran World Federation. The President will report on his findings at the 2022 Convention. Adopted unanimously.

Res. 5-09A This resolution affirms the biblical confession of a six-day creation and to help congregations address issues related to the intersections of faith and science. Debate ensued over the use of the word "natural" in six "natural" days. In the end, amendments to change the word failed, and the original res olution passed. Adopted 72% in favor.

Res. 5-11 This addresses the question about unity in doctrine and uniformity and variety in practice.

The CTCR is to study this and prepare a bible study on the issue designed for congregational use, dis cussion, and guidance. Adopted by voice vote.

Floor Committee #6 – Pastoral Ministry and Seminaries

- Res. 6-01 All constituents of the LCMS are to encourage, financially support and directly participate in a multi-year church worker recruitment initiative. Adopted 90.9% in favor.
- Res. 6-02 That Synod, District Presidents, and seminaries strongly encourage men to do residential pastoral minis try as the best route to the ministry. Adopted 71.1% in favor.
- Res. 6-03A The Pastoral Formation Committee is to work on the curriculum and standards of the SMP program in light of the curriculum and standards of the residential seminaries, including instruction in biblical lan guages, and work out the timing for SMP vicarage and ordination which the joint board of regents will prepare for consideration in the 2022 Convention. The COP and the PFC will draft guidelines regarding mentoring and supervision of SMPs. The LCMS will encourage districts to provide funding for SMP stu dents as needed. Adopted. 70.4% in favor.
- Res. 6-04 The Synod and district presidents support, encourage, and expect all LCMS pastors to be engaged in continuing education throughout their pastoral ministry. Adopted by voice vote.

Floor Committee #7 – University Education

- Res. 7-02 Our Lutheran schools will make students aware from a young age of the opportunity for higher education at CUS institutions. Congregations will make names, addresses, and emails of high school students (with permission) available to CUS for recruitment. Adopted 94.6% in favor.
- Res. 7-05A

 To recognize and give thanks for the work at Concordia Selma for its 97 years. Vigorous debate ensued after a Regent from Concordia Selma commented from the stage that those involved at the university were "hurt" and "blindsided" by what happened. Accusations were made from the floor. Dr. Wente, president of the Concordia University System was given the podium and outlined all the steps that were taken over several decades to make Concordia Selma viable. The CUS sent professors, Concordia university presidents, financial analysts, and others to Selma to help and to figure out how to turn things around. Later President Harrison approached the microphone from the floor to address the assembly. He stressed the efforts made on behalf of Concordia College Alabama "to find a way forward." There were efforts put in by the Board of Directors, Concordia University System and the presidents of its colleges and universities, the Lutheran Church Extension Fund, and the Council of Presidents, as well as by the regents and campus leadership. Harrison noted the pain, especially for those directly connected, of losing Selma; the historical challenges of and hardships in Black Ministry; his "feeling horrible" at the loss of the campus on his watch; and his prayer that we can go forward. He noted sadness that the "worst construction" is being put on "what was the effort of decades to make the thing go." Amendments were made to remove some of the Whereas statements. The amendment failed, but the Floor Committee was charged to come back Thursday with a revised resolution. The revised resolution eliminated any references to reasons for the closing of Selma. The revised Resolution was Adopted by a voice vote as the last order of the day.

Encouraging a Synodwide 1.1.1 Funding Model for Defined Mission Outcomes. In this, each member of synod gives one extra dollar, per week, for one year

to Mission work.

Floor Committee #9 – Structure and Administration

Res. 9-05 Amending the Constitution to clear up advisory or-

dained participation in the district convention, to allow multi-congregation parishes to send additional advisory lay delegates to convention, to clarify individual membership with convention representation and attendance, to remove or correct excessive duplication of language and to allow CUW/CUWAA to build upon the lay ministry program. Adopted 91.1% in favor. This will require ratification by the congrega-

tions of Synod.

Res. 9-16 This would allow the District President access to the status of congregations registration for voting for

Synodical President for the sole purpose of encouraging their registration for greater congregational participation. Adopted 56.6% in favor.

The CCM in conjunction with the COP, including a Res. 9-17 number of commissioned ministers chosen by the

COP, prepare a report regarding the historic and current voting privileges in Synod. This report will be available 18 months prior to the 2022 Convention. This is about whether or not to grant voting privileges to commissioned advisory delegates (teachers, DCEs, directors of Christian outreach, directors of family life ministry, directors of parish music, deaconesses, parish assistants and certified lay ministers. Adopted


