# A Message from Pastor

Dear brothers and sisters in Christ,

September is often my favorite month of the year. The weather is typically warm during the day and cool at night. Football season kicks-off. And I **love** football. The leaves begin to change. Kids are back in school. A sense of "normalcy", whatever that is, settles in. Hopefully, we all feel rested and refreshed from summer.

This is true of St. Paul as well. And while we never take a "vacation" from worshiping God or serving our neighbors in love, nevertheless, September brings with it a sense of "new beginnings" and a return to "normalcy". School is back in session. Worship times will return to our "normal" schedule. New Bible studies and opportunities to serve have begun or will begin shortly.

Speaking of new, our school has a new theme verse for the 2019-2020 school year. Our theme verse is: "Rejoice always, pray without ceasing, give thanks in all circumstances; for this is the will of God in Christ Jesus for you" (1 Thessalonians 5:16-18, ESV). There's a lot to unpack in this sentence. And yet, it sums up how we, as followers of Jesus Christ, are to live and act.

But isn't it impossible to always rejoice? Isn't it impossible to pray all the time? And how in the world can we give thanks no matter what happens in our lives and in the world? What a bunch of baloney! And yet, this is the will of God in Christ Jesus for us. What gives? And how are we to do this?

It might seem impossible to live a life in which one is always joyful. But for the person who follows Jesus by faith there is joy even in sorrow. Why? Because we know that Jesus rules heaven and earth. God uses sorrow to draw us closer to Him (Romans 5:3-5). And sorrow can never, ever separate us from God's love (Romans 8:39). The Holy Spirit helps us and prays for us in our weaknesses. And we know and trust God to keep His promises to watch over us and care for us even in our sorrows.

Ok, but how do we pray without ceasing? Certainly we're not to stay at all times with our hands folded and heads bowed in continuous

prayer? As believers, we commit all things at all times to God who cares for us. We do this in addition to our more formal and routine prayers. This is what it means to pray without ceasing.

But our prayer isn't limited to just words and thoughts. "Whatever you do, in word or deed, do everything in the name of the Lord Jesus, giving thanks to God the Father through Him" (Colossians 3:17, ESV). The simplest actions of every believer, whether laborer, farmer, businessperson, clerk, police officer, etc. is praying without ceasing.

Moreover, our actions are the primary ways we give thanks in all circumstances. After all, our entire being — body, mind, and soul — is to be offered "as a living sacrifice, holy and acceptable to God, which is [your] spiritual worship" (Romans 12:1, ESV). In all we think, say, and do we are to give thanks to God, even when we think we have little to give thanks for. If you just take a moment, and reflect on all you have, you will find many things to thank God for.

As you return to "normalcy" and search out "new" opportunities to grow in faith, love, and service, keep in mind Paul's words of encouragement, and our school's theme verse, from 1 Thessalonians 5:16-18. In fact, write it out and post it somewhere that you'll see it every day as a reminder. Perhaps on the bathroom mirror or closet door. Seek out a "new" way to continue to build your relationship with God through Jesus and/or serve your neighbor. And by "new", I mean through a new Bible study here at St. Paul or at home. I mean through a new way of serving here at St. Paul or in your community that you haven't done before. Encourage your family or a friend or two to do something "new" together. And soon, you'll find yourself rejoicing always, praying without ceasing, and giving thanks in all circumstances. In other words, you'll find yourself living and acting according to God's will in Christ Jesus for you.

# The Bookeeper's Corner

The Church Council has some serious decisions to make regarding our finances. We need your help to make the right decisions.

As you know, we have begun our Calendar Year (CY) 2020 budget cycle. According to our By-Laws, the proposed budget must be presented to the Voters in December for approval. Preliminary numbers are not guesses: they are actuals. Our projected wage/benefits/tax expense for CY 2020 far exceed our projected income. Something has to change.

We have not yet included normal operating budget expenses by Elders and Trustees and already our expenses are over \$1 million dollars. We do not take in that kind of revenue. To balance a budget, you must increase income, decrease expenses, or a combination of the two. Presenting a deficit budget to the congregation for approval means we are not stewarding our resources properly.

To that end, Church Council has called for a **Congregational Meeting** for Sunday, September 15<sup>th</sup> at 1:30 p.m. This is NOT a voter's meeting. The church finances will be presented to educate the congregation on where we are heading. We want members to cast their ideas to mitigate financial disaster – NO IDEA WILL BE TURNED AWAY. Ask questions – learn how money is spent – see where revenue comes from as it relates to attendance, age groups and school tuition. The intent is to give you a clear picture of what comes in and what goes out and why.

We will not make motions. We will not vote. We will not have discussions about ideas. Rather, we will record any and all ideas, compile, and pass to the appropriate board for discussion.

This is your single opportunity to let the Board members know how we should steward your contributions. Please put this very important meeting on your calendar.


